

HYDRANGEA ANOMALA - Climbing hydrangea



Primarily suited to a North or East facing wall.

Flowers are
produced on last
year's shoots, so
prune now to
allow them to
develop
flowering wood
for next year.

As with all plants there are different varieties...deciduous, evergreen & hardy & the climbing hydrangea is no different.

Although they can be slow to get going, once established they are vigorous & beautiful.

- CUT BACK ANY LONG SHOOTS
- PRUNE BACK OTHER SHOOTS TO A LEAF BUD TO KEEP THE SHRUB IN ITS SPACE!
- IT CAN BE HARD PRUNED IN SPRING, BUT FLOWER PRODUCTION WILL BE MUCH LESS, SO DO IT GRADUALLY

<u>Camellia & Rhododendron</u> <u>Care</u>

The acid loving evergreen shrubs are needing moisture......Water and feed through August as this is when the tiny flower buds in the tips of the stems start to develop. If the soil is dry, they won't form properly, so keep the roots moist at all times.

It's important to know if you have English or French.....

Traditional advice used to be that you should never cut into the old wood. However, opinions have changed and gardeners are now told to cut back to about 22cm (9ins). What is critical, is that you cut to just above a group of new shoots. Go any lower and the lavender will die. (Thompson-Morgan)

ARE YOU BRAVE ENOUGH TO GIVE IT A GO!!!!!!

AUGUST JOBS TO BE GETTING ON WITH...... KEEP GOING WITH THE DEADHEADING...FEEDING** & WEEDING

Prune Summer fruiting raspberries - cut all canes that have fruited to ground level, leaving the new canes to develop for next years fruit.

Save your herbs by drying

Keep an eye out for aphids on the underside of leaves.

Plant on rooted strawberry runners

Cut evergreen hedges into good shape & order - doing this in August allows the cut shoots to harden off before the weather cools & there is a frost risk!

Finish dividing clumps of bearded iris so new roots & flower buds have time to form.

Prune rambling roses – removing up to a 1/3 of flowered stems & tie in the remaining into supports.

Sweetcorn's are ready to harvest when you pop a corn with your nail & the juices are milky!

**If you are feeding your plants – don't feed a thirsty plant – it will cause further dehydration due to reverse osmosis!! So, feed after watering & consider using half strength feed ratio.

As penstemon flowers fade, cut back to just above a leaf to encourage more flowers.
