SUMMER FLOWERING BULBS – It may seem early but you are giving the bulb a great start to their Summer show.

Set them
off in a
container to
give
protection
from wet,
cold earth.







Crocs in the bottom for drainage.
Plant into a free draining compost & water well.

As temperatures rise they'll burst into life & not be sulking in the sodden ground. Transplant after the frosts or leave in the pot!. Try with liatris, eucomis & liiles

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Tool Cleaning - I'm not convinced there's a person around that diligently cleans their tools after every use.....but now is the time to get them ready for the next season & also reduce the risk of spreading infection around the garden!

- Strong detergent, hot water and a good scrub to get rid of sap and muddy build up.
- After drying with a cloth, sharpen the blades with a whetstone, file or take them to a local professional.
- o A drop of oil on hinges & moving parts.
- Wipe the blades with isopropyl alcohol to disinfect and a smear of WD40 or similar.



Set up a "tool cleaning station" – A bucket of sharp sand mixed with 3-in-one oil to make a "damp" consistency and after use plunge your tools into this gritty spa to protect their finish and keep them rust free.

FEBRUARY JOBS TO BE GETTING ON WITH

Reposition any deciduous trees/shrubs if the soil isn't frozen or waterlogged

Clean & sharpen tools & check the mower etc is in good working order

Deadhead Winter pansies to stop them setting seed and it will encourage a new flush of flowers as the weather starts to warm up

Prune Summer flowering clematis towards the end of Feb

> Chit 1st early potatoes

Prune Winter flowering jasmine after flowering. Cut back previous year's growth to 5cm from old wood

Remove leaves with hellebore leaf spot



Order seeds, plug plants, onion sets & asparagus crowns ready for Spring planting

Trim deciduous hedges before the birds start nesting

Prune Autumn fruiting raspberry canes to the ground

Trim Winter flowering heathers as the flowers disappear

Prune wisteria by cutting back Summer side shoots to 2 - 3 buds

Force rhubarb Lift & divide snowdrops whilst they "are in the plants for an green" early crop

Prune blackcurrant, gooseberries & redcurrants to keep a productive framework

If the ground isn't frozen, prepare seed beds - dig out perennial weeds, fork in plenty of compost & cover with fleece, polythene or cloches

Remove yellowing leaves from brassicas to prevent downy mildew spread

*** TOP TIP THAT WORKS ***

Are you fed up of growing or buying soft fruits that go mouldy in 1 - 2 days?

I decided to give this method a go & best of all it works! These cherries were bought on the 23rd December 2024......washed following the recipe below & stored in an airtight jar in the fridge......this is how they looked on the 26th January......tip top condition & no taste change! (I know there's a vinegar version etc but its smelly & there's an aftertaste) Works with raspberries, strawberries & blackberries......give it a go & let me know how you get on!



Citric Wash

2 teaspoons of lemon juice

400mls water

- Mix the lemon juice & water together
- Submerge the fruits & leave for up to a minute
 - o Drain
 - Put into an airtight container - date
 - o Refrigerate
