BIRD CARE FOR WINTER

NOW IS THE TIME TO INVEST IN THE BIRD FEEDERS & BIRD BATHS.





As temperatures change the birds use a lot of energy to keep warm, and food in the coming months will be harder for them to find. Get them used to knowing that you provide a food source. Nuts, seeds and other energy-rich food sources will be welcome......whilst they currently have access to berries etc, put out regular small amounts so it isn't wasted & goes mouldy. Keep feeders & baths clean to prevent the spread of disease.

Don't forget the more birds & wildlife are encouraged into the garden, the more pests they will devour when you need their help!

OCTOBER JOBS TO BE GETTING ON WITH:-

- Protect ½ hardy plants with fleece
- Lift & divide crowded perennials
- Keep on top of fallen leaves they can harbour fungal spores & give homes to slugs & snails
- Plant hedges, trees & shrubs
- Cut back yellowing asparagus foliage to 5cms
- Protect Autumn cauliflowers by wrapping the outer leaves around them or use a cloche or fleece
- Harvest pumpkins and squashes
- Tie in next year's raspberry canes
- Divide rhubarb crowns
- Apply a Winter wash to fruit trees & wrap the trunk with a grease band to prevent Winter moth damage
- Check your tree & plant stakes
- Check stored veg & fruit & discard any that are rotting






PUSCHKINIA LIBANOTICA SQUILL

HARDWOOD CUTTINGS FROM DECIDUOUS PLANTS

If you haven't tried taking cuttings from deciduous plants this is the year to give it a go......it's a process for the long game......as the cuttings are taken now and left until next Autumn.....the process is simple and the rewards are high!



healthy shoot from this years growth

2. Remove the soft tip growth

3. Cut into sections

1. Select a vigorous

- 15-20cms long
 4. Cut above the bud
- at an angle
 5. Cut straight across
 the base below a
 bud
- 6. Insert into deep containers using a 50:50 grit to compost ratio OR a slit trench in the ground
- 7. Leave a ¼, 1-3 buds above soil level depending on cutting length
- 8. Leave until the following Autumn then lift & transplant

AUTUMNAL ROSE CARE - Although harder pruning can be done later on, there are a few elements of rose care that will help these stunning shrubs if done in Autumn.

Tidy the plant...remove spent blooms...remove diseased foliage...reduce their height to reduce windrock



Snip off spent & soggy flowers to prevent rot...if your rose produces hips then just remove the petals.

Prune out and dead, damaged, diseased or crossing stems. Aim for an open structure to allow good air flow.

Shorten the stems of tall roses to reduce the risk of wind rock in storms. Try & cut on an outward facing bud if possible.



Prune rambling & climbers when flowers have finished and tie in the stems.

Thin out the heads of the statuesque standard rose as when congested the wind can snap off the thinner stems.
